COVID-19 EMERGENCY APPEAL update

A rapid response from our amazing donors has ensured that Cabrini is equipped and ready to support our community's health needs in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The early support has meant that Cabrini has already received vital equipment for the Emergency Department, Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and Respiratory and Infectious Diseases ward

The additional equipment includes new ICU beds, which has increased our capacity to treat more patients who are critically unwell.

A dialysis machine for the ICU will ensure an increased number of patients who need dialysis can have their treatment within the ICU setting.

Additional equipment for the Emergency Department includes disposable bronchoscopes, which emergency physicians use to quickly and easily diagnose respiratory conditions.

Beyond the COVID-19 pandemic, this new equipment means that Cabrini can treat more patients who have complex medical conditions, such as cardiac patients who need admission to the ICU.

LOCAL COVID-19 SURVIVOR SAYS:

"Thank you for saving my life."

Michael Naylor was a fit, healthy and physically active 51-year-old who had never been seriously ill in his life, then COVID-19 brought him to his knees.

On the morning of Sunday 15 March, Michael woke up feeling like he was starting to develop a cold, but by the Thursday he was struggling.

"My temperature had risen from 38 to 41 degrees," says Michael. "My chest was tight, I couldn't breathe very well and I felt most unwell. So I went to Cabrini, and I was admitted straight away."

Michael had viral pneumonia in both lungs. His worst fears were confirmed – COVID-19. Michael's lung capacity was already down to 50% and his temperature was dangerously high. He went straight into an ICU isolation room.

Over the next four days Michael's body did everything it could to fight the virus attacking his body. And very nearly lost. His fever was continually at 42 degrees.

"I've always been a tough, very resilient human being, but this just took me to my knees."

"I was burning up, cooking alive inside," he says. "My organs were starting to shut down and I was starting to give up. I was delirious and I felt couldn't go on any

longer." Michael's wife stayed on the phone with him telling him to fight, that he wasn't alone, and he would pull through. And she

was right, Michael was not alone. Alongside him were two young nurses, Trevor and Jack.

"Jack saved my life. I have no doubt about it," says Michael. "Jack put me in a cold shower then packed me with ice. The ice packs burned off every 15 to 20 minutes, so



Jack and Trevor got Michael through those terrifying hours, but he was a long way from being out of the woods. It took two more days of hell before Michael's fever finally broke and he began to turn the corner.

Today, he has nothing but praise for Cabrini. "Paul McMurrick was extraordinary. Way beyond what you'd expect. And the nursing staff were sensational, especially Trevor and Jack. They just went above and beyond."

"Dr Jun (JK) Khoo and Dr Nicholas Manolitsas were so professional and immediate with their response. Dr Khoo is thorough, detailed and communicative. His follow up on my health now and further testing has been remarkable. Dr Khoo has my upmost respect and gratitude."

amazing GIFT

Belinda Lim was only 40 years-old when she died of oesophageal cancer.

A Melbourne Grammar student, Belinda worked with her father in the restaurant business and was in commercial property management.

"She was a kind soul, the most loving caring person you could ever meet. She had a kind and loving heart," said her partner of seven years Scott Beaumont.

Ms Lim passed away at Cabrini Palliative Care in 2016. Mr Beaumont, who cared for her until she passed, said Belinda would love that her gift was helping others. "It makes me feel at peace that she was remembered and she's helping save other people's lives. For me it means there was significance to her life"

A new high-tech, cutting-edge microscope has been funded by the generous bequest of the Late Belinda Lim. Featuring a robotic arm and the latest in 3D operating technology, the Zeiss microscope has placed Cabrini at the forefront of neurosurgery in the world and is saving the lives of thousands of patients.

Used almost daily by Cabrini neurosurgeons such as Dr Tony Goldschlager, the **Zeiss Kinveo 900 microscope** is vital in ensuring maximum patient safety by allowing microsurgery to be carried out with pinpoint precision.

Providing high-quality illumination and magnification of the operative field, usually deep below the skin or skull surface, the microscope enables structures to be carefully visualised.

It also enables the surgical and nursing assistants to be active participants during a surgical procedure with the ability to visualise the procedure on a monitor.

"It provides state-of-the-art neurosurgery, which is the highest level that's available in the world right now," said Dr Tony Goldschlager.

Dr Goldschlager is a leading neurosurgeon with extensive training in the management of brain tumours, pituitary tumours, and complex spine conditions.

"I've worked in the US and in Canada and we are better than those centres," he said.

"The microscope has been an absolute game changer for us by enhancing the quality of the operations we can do. It also makes the theatre team work better because they can all see what's going."

CABRINI JOINS AUSTRALIAN TRIAL

into treatment for COVID-19

Cabrini has joined with more than 80 hospitals across Australia and New Zealand in a trial of treatments for COVID-19.

The Australasian COVID-19 Trial (ASCOT) will determine the efficacy of using existing antimalarial and HIV treatments against the virus.

There is currently no treatment for COVID-19, but the World Health Organisation considers that both these treatments could be promising.

The study is only made possible by the support of Cabrini Foundation donors.

This support has ensured funding to employ a part-time research nurse to coordinate the study over the next 12-18 months.

The aim of ASCOT is to test whether using these existing drugs will prevent patients deteriorating to the point of needing a ventilator in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU).

Associate Professor Vineet Sarode, Director of Cabrini ICU, said: "We hope by participating in this important research project, we can potentially save a lot of lives, not just here in Australia, but all over the world."

Patients who are hospitalised with a positive diagnosis will be screened to see if they

are suitable to participate in the trial. Their treatment will be compared with more than 2000 patients nationally to determine which is the most effective treatment.

The international study is designed to be able to adapt if needed with possible new treatments added if they show promise or others suspended if they prove to be ineffective.
